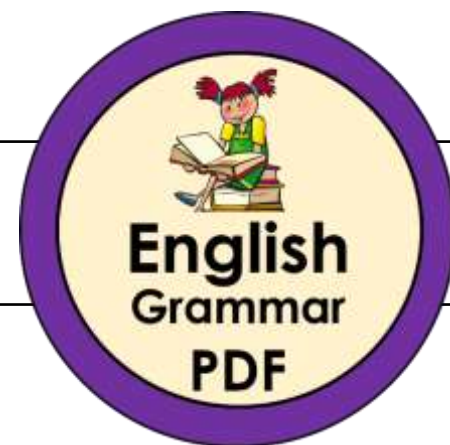


# Correlative Conjunction
